- ☞ More comfortable for families with young children – wider aisles, less crowded, doors are always open

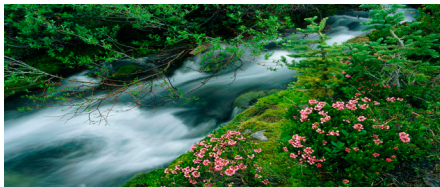
Family Service

Tashlich

First Day of Rosh Hashanah, 4:00 PM,
Calabazas Park, by the creek

Join us for this lovely experience as we symbolically cast our sins into the flowing stream, as a physical gesture of our sincere desire for repentance and renewal. Some have the custom of throwing bread crumbs, representing our sins. Don't miss this enactment of our wish, in the words of Rabbi Dan Shevitz, to "cast away the crumbs of last year's leftovers." It's also a great opportunity to be outside on the day we mark the creation of the world.

Please bring a dairy or pareve snack to share and we'll have some social time after Tashlich. We suggest that those whose last names begin with A - I bring drinks, J - Q bring snacks, and R - Z bring sweets. If you can't bring food, don't worry, come anyway!

Youth Activities

Special age-appropriate High Holy Days services and activities have been arranged for school-age youth (kindergarten through high school seniors) during High Holy Day services. Children must be with their parents *except during organized youth activities*. Please make sure that your children are not roaming the buildings and grounds unsupervised.

- The *Sukkah Decorating Event* on Sunday, September 19 from 10:30 AM to 12:30 PM at which our children will help decorate the Congregation Beth David Sukkah.

- Our celebration of *Simchat Torah* begins on Thursday, September 30 at 7:30 PM when we welcome new students beginning their Jewish education with a special presentation and proceed to sing and dance with our Torah scrolls. The fun continues on Friday, October 1 at 9:30 AM when we fully roll out one Torah scroll, finish reading the end of the Torah and immediately begin reading of the Torah literally at the beginning.
