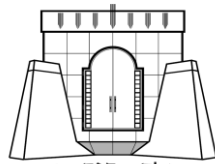

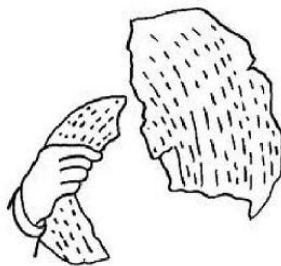

Yachatz
Rabbi Daniel Pressman

[The Torah designates the matzah as] *lehem oni*, because it is bread upon which we declare [*onim*] many things. Another interpretation: *lehem oni* — [Although the word is pronounced] bread of *oni*, it is written *ani* [poor]. Just as it is the way of a poor person [to eat] of a broken loaf [of bread, rather than a whole loaf], Here too, [one should fulfill the mitzvah of matzah] with a broken [matzah]. (Pesachim 115B-116A)

This is another reminder of the slavery and suffering of Egypt. Unlike benevolent slave-owners whose own self-interest requires that they be concerned with the health and nutrition of their slaves, the Egyptians sought to deplete the Jews through malnutrition, overwork, and murder of the male infants. Therefore, a slave would never eat a complete matzah; he would always hoard part of it for a later meal when he might have no food at all. Therefore, too, the larger part of the Yachatz matzah is set aside for the Afikoman: a hungry slave would seek to conserve as much food as he could (Rav Hai Gaon, head of the Talmudic academy of Pumpedita, 939-1038).

What does it really mean to hold up this small piece of matzah and invite anyone who is hungry to come share it? ... What would it be like to really only have a crust, so to speak, and to share that piece with another hungry person?

Some people are most generous when they feel they have more than enough for themselves. Maybe I've set aside ten quarters to give out as I stroll down Broadway in the Upper West Side, knowing that I have ten dollars in my pocket for my own needs. Maybe I gave \$200 to a charity knowing that a lot of that would go to taxes if I didn't disburse it myself. This act of giving creates a hierarchy, where one person is a benefactor and a recipient. But homeless people also give to each other, and even the poorest person is mandated in Jewish law to give tzedakah. Economically, sharing the *lehem oni*, poor bread, means that we invite other hungry and needy people to truly join us, as equals in our poverty. On a spiritual level, we invite others in despite our broken, limited perspective, without pretending to be able to see or understand the whole picture. In both realms, it makes sense to imagine that this action could make us free people, *b'ney horin*. (Rabbi David Seidenberg)

We break what was perfectly whole and then hide it (as the *afikoman*). This moment is the spiritual introduction to the seder: What is broken and lost can be found. It will be found and made whole once again. This is the story of the Israelites—strong and then enslaved, broken and then redeemed—that has provided hope for Jews throughout history and offers personal inspiration for us today as well. We begin our lives as whole selves. As we move through childhood into adulthood, some parts of us get broken, other parts of the personality go astray. We ritualize this process of becoming whole concretely through the mending of the imperfect and broken that takes place. Only when what is broken is reunited with what makes it whole, can the journey be complete. Only when we embrace the broken part of ourselves and claim it as our own—rather than pushing it away—can we be fully ourselves once again. Only when all are free, only when all are fed and taken care of, only when we can fully be ourselves, can Redemption and a completeness of Creation occur—what is often referred to as *tikkun olam*, the repair of the world. (Rabbi Kerry Olitzky, *Preparing Your Heart for Passover*)
